The major requires 33 credit hours: 6 credits at the 200 level*, 18 at the 300 level, and 9 at the 400 level.



MINOR IN SPANISH

The minor requires 18 credit hours: 6 credits at the 200 level* and 12 credits in courses you choose at the 300 or 400 levels. A minor in Spanish is useful to supplement majors in sciences, social sciences, and humanities where communication and proficiency in Spanish is important.

*Advanced Placement and Retroactive Credits

Your proficiency may allow you to start at the 300 level. We welcome and offer direct access to advanced courses for students who have earned the NE Seal of Biliteracy. Any student prepared for SPAN 202 or higher may earn from 3 to 6 free retroactive credit hours.
